## THE SOUTH OF THE THAMES SECOND CLASS INTER CLUB RACE

Perry (South Norwood Harriers), ably assisted by Mr. S.E. Musk (of the Reindeer Harriers), seven clubs entered, and the event was brought to a successful issue last Saturday from the Freemasons' Hotel, Battersea Rise, Wandsworth Common. In the end the winner turned up in W. Jones of the Reindeer H., hotly pursued by A. Fowles, of the Oakley Harriers; another Reindeer, E.J. Eagles, finishing third. 'The Sporting Life' further reported:

Soon after the start Strathie and Jones went to the front, and at half a mile were running in close order, but a tail had already formed of fully 100 yards. A mile and a half having been covered Jones was forcing the pace from Strathie, Bailey, Eagles, Chown, Daffern, Gibbs, and G.A. Fowles. The leader kept his place until four miles had been reeled off, when Gibbs headed Campbell by twenty yards, with Jones next. The latter, however, went to the front again, and half a mile from the finish was running level with A. Fowles, Eagles being about eighty yards behind. Jones now went away from Fowles, who was slightly impeded in the run-in, and won as stated above.

High tea having had full justice done to it, Mr. S.T. Brown (Finchley H.) took the chair. Amongst those present were A. Sinclair (S.C.C.C.A.), W.H. Tope W.A.C.) H. Wright (Ranelagh H), S.E. Musk and A.C. Gladwell (Reindeer H.) W.J. Perry (hon. sec. of the meet), H Gilbey (Oakley Harriers), and E.E. Gibbs (St. Luke's Harriers). The programme commenced with a brilliant pianoforte solo by Signor Vanoli, after which Mr. R.E. Keys (O.H.) gave "Sailing," and Mr. T.T. Chown was heard to advantage in "The Shoreditch Handicap." "Nobody Knows," by Mr. H. Wright (Argus H) and the "Dream of the Albert Hall," by Mr. E.G. Fenning (R.H) were well received, and then the virtues of the late "Tom Bowling" were extolled by Mr. C. Gabriel (O.H.). Mr. H.J. Smithson (O.H.) now gave a recitation "How we beat the favourite," and after Mr. W.T. Scraggs (A.H.) had given "As long as the world goes round." the chairman, Mr. S.T. Brown, obliged with one of his humorous compositions, a parody on "Jack's Yarn," and on coming in for an ovation recited in a truly comical manner "The Showman." When Mr. Short (Christ Church Surrey Institute) had sung "How d'ye do dear boy" and "To be there," the prizes were presented. Medals were given by the Association to the first three men in, and to each of the first six men in the winning team. The Reindeer Harriers also presented their winning six with medals and several of the other clubs announced their intention of doing likewise. Harmony was then resumed, and showed every sign of continuing to a very late (or possibly early) hour. The junior clubs may certainly be congratulated on the way in which the affair was brought to a head.
